MAY-HEM IS NOT UNITY

When I went through the steps the first few times it became abundantly obvious that I was the "tornado in people's lives". I seemed to be in conflict with everything and everyone. Most of all myself. Wherever I went I took me with me... Occasionally in sobriety I can find myself in that place still. I am not cured. I get a daily reprieve contingent on the maintenance of my spiritual condition.

The last few years of my drinking career brought me to places that when people saw me they went the other way. This began the road to my isolation. My grand sponsor Clancy would call alcoholism the "disease of separation". That is where my alcoholism brought me. Separated from you: DISUNITY.

If I was "to know a new freedom and a new happiness" as it says in the 9th step promises on page 83 of the book *Alcoholics Anonymous*, "selfseeking would slip away" I would have to learn how to be in UNITY with you and my fellows as a 'MEMBER' in Alcoholics Anonymous, not just an 'ATTENDER'! I can sit in a chicken coop; that does not make me a chicken...

What I find that separates me from you, is when we bring outside issues into Alcoholics Anonymous. Tradition 5 (The Long Form) states: "Each Alcoholics Anonymous group ought to be a spiritual entity HAVING BUT ONE PRI-MARY PURPOSE - that of carrying its message to the alcoholic who still suffers." This is expanded upon in Tradition 10 (The Long Form) states: "No AA group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate AA, express any opinion on outside controversial issues - particularly those of politics, alcohol reform or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one concerning such matters they can express no views whatever."

There is a lot of politics being brought into Alcoholics Anonymous in contemporary AA. What groups do at a local level to address these issues is their business, so long as they are not trying to bring it to a society level at the District, county (General Service or Intergroup) area, regional or conference structure as a whole. That is why we have all of these specialty pamphlets published to address these issues and help those AT THE GROUP LEVEL. They are not intended to be imposed on all the MEMBERS of our society as a whole to conform to the political views of the outside world. They were developed to improve our 'effectiveness and understanding' as a society. Remember what it says in *Our Common Welfare* statement expressed in our safety card: "Alcoholics Anonymous is a microcosm of the larger society that we exist in. As such, problems found in the outside world can also make their way into the rooms of AA."

The safety issue is addressing UNITY in the spirit of Tradition 5. If we do not stay unified as a society, the message of hope and recovery found here in Alcoholics Anonymous will not be here for generations to come. This is what happened to the Washingtonian Movement in the 1840s... (Politics). It created MAY-HEM at a society level. It separates you from me - DISUNITY.

Happy Hour in Hampton Bays — Group History

St. Rosalie RC Church 31 East Montauk Highway Hampton Bays, NY 11946

Steps at Noon, as it was known back then, was started between 1981 and 1983 by Alice C and Peggy H. Both of them were mothers of youngsters and could not attend evening meetings. Hampton



Bays Afternoon was already meeting and they decided another day meeting was needed. Alice attended for many years, but became uncomfortable when the meeting began to be called "the Alice Meeting" and she moved on to other meetings. By then, her children had grown up.

An interesting point about this meeting and its original name. The group didn't meet at noon. It met at 12:30 PM which may have caused some confusion and contributed to people not showing up or showing up at the wrong time.

One longtime member shared that the group was moved around quite a bit. They met first in the basement. Three long tables were lined up and the speaker sat at the opposite end of one. Then they were moved to the gym. For about six months, they relocated to the Lutheran Church, probably because construction was going on. When they returned, they were moved to the basement of the new administration building. Here they had to contend with weird acoustics, which made the slightest noise much louder. In addition, the room was sterile, with no carpet, photos, or even much air.

When a new priest came on board, their next move wasn't much better. They now met in the enormous gym. There was little privacy and even less warmth. The heating system would need to be cranked up hours before the meeting for any relief from the constant cold. Finally, they got a nice cozy room in the administration building. Through many of the various moves, Ted ran the meeting. (Note – the photo accompanying this history was taken in 2005. The Archives Committee would appreciate it if someone could send a more recent photo of the meeting room.)

In the July 2016 Suffolk meeting list, a time adjustment was made to 1:00 PM and the name was changed to Happy Hour in the Hamptons. They shut down during the pandemic. When they reopened and were put back on the meeting list, the name was simplified to Happy Hour. But they were finally meeting at noon. It only took them thirty years to get there

AA History – May

May 11, 1935 - Alone in the lobby of the Mayflower Hotel in Akron in between the bar & the pay phone, Bill W. calls Walter Tunks who refers him to Henrietta Seiberling who introduces Bill to Dr. Bob.

May 12, 1935 @ 5pm - Mother's Day Bill W. and Dr. Bob meet for the first time at the Seiberling home.

May 1, 1939 - Bank forecloses on 182 Clinton Street.

May 6, 1939 - Clarence S. tells Dr. Bob, his sponsor, he won't be back to Oxford Group meetings in Akron. Instead starts first "AA" meetings in Cleveland.

May 11, 1939 - first group to officially call itself "Alcoholics Anonymous" meets at Abby G's house in Cleveland.

1940 - Rollie H., Cleveland Indians, first anonymity break on national level.

1950 - Shortly before his death, Dr. Bob tells Bill, "I reckon we ought to be buried like other folks."

1951 - Al-Anon founded by Lois W. and Anne B.

1980 - *Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers* published
